St. Peter's has a large cohort of students who come from far away (including international students), and it has shown that making these students feel welcome is one of the main priorities. As part of this group, I have had the privilege of experiencing the welcoming atmosphere the school provides to all of us when we arrive.

To ensure our wellbeing, the school is concerned with preserving and embracing the different cultures and customs we bring from our countries. An example of this is Culture Day, this annual event in our school allows every student of our community to promote their own cultures and demonstrate the similarities we all share.

One memory of mine that encapsulates the welcoming spirit of our school is from my first week. I had been in Ireland for about seven months and was already familiar with the language and a good bit of the culture. When I came into the school on my first day, I initially felt a mix of excitement and uncertainty. However, that unease quickly faded away when I was introduced to a few of my classmates, that later on, became my friends. They all gave me a quick tour of the school. As we were walking through the corridors, they talked about different subjects and teachers, and also oriented me on how a few things worked. That orientation was crucial for my adaptation to the school, and the memory of that day is still very special to me.

In addition to the warm reception I received from my friends, the school staff played an important role in my



journey of adaptation. Teachers were very understanding and also very interested in knowing where I came from, which showed me I was now part of the school community and no longer an outsider.

By embracing the range of cultures and customs brought by students from around the world, our school has created an environment where we all feel like valued members of a family. Culture Day, my initial warm welcome by my friends, and the genuine interest shown by teachers, all are examples of the welcoming spirit that defines our school. As I continue my educational journey here, it is evident that creating a diverse and inclusive community is not just a priority, but a shared commitment. This sense of belonging, whether it's the friendships, the supportive staff, or the embracing of our cultures, is what makes our school truly special.



Many people who know me in my current life are often surprised to hear of the struggles I went through in first year. I had a difficult time adjusting to school life and felt like an outsider among my peers, as I didn't come from the same primary school as all of them. It seemed that way at first, but as I began to make friends and open myself up to learning new things, I discovered a new perspective on school. It turned into a place where I could learn, grow, and find my place in the world. My first few weeks at school were challenging to say the least. No friends, zero clue what to do, and not really wanting to do work but still determined to give it my best shot. It was quite the journey getting there.

Christmas exam time! I knew these were some of the most important tests I'd take yet, and I was definitely a bit nervous. These exams were going to be very similar to the real thing, so I knew I couldn't take them lightly. Thankfully, studying for them for the past couple of months had helped prepare me, and I treated them as a trial run for the main exams. Plus, I knew how to study in an effective way that played to my strengths, like mind mapping for visual learning or hearing my notes aloud as an aural learner. All in all, I felt ready for Christmas exam time! The Exam days arrived and I was ready. Months of studying had led up to this moment. Walking into the hall, I stayed quiet, took my seat and the exam began. Focused on the questions, I worked fast and was the first out. Satisfied, I left with relief, accomplishment and a sense of success.

I had really found my place in that St. Peter's and it seemed like others had started to take notice too. I found myself approaching more and more people from my year group, and it turned out that they actually liked me! This was great for my self-confidence. It got even better when I started seeing the results of my efforts in class - I was getting

consistently 80+ on exams and tests, making me one of the top students in my year. When things were finally looking up for me one of my friends moved away at this point so we had a goodbye ceremony for him.

After the holidays and celebrations of a new year, the grindstone welcomed back learners with exams and increased studying. I had grown used to this, being one of the top students in my year through consistent studying. The months after Christmas leading up to sports day feel like a blur. Sports day was one of my favourite parts of the end of the year. Everyone got to have extra fun, try new things, and see how they measured up against their classmates. This was the last chance to show what I had learned over the past school year. And it was also my final chance to impress my teachers, if I wanted to leave school with good grades. No pressure, right? I took a deep breath and began. I knew I just needed to focus on the questions in front of me, and I'd do just fine. By the end of the year, I was really happy with how my school life had progressed. I had so many friends that I actually couldn't keep up with all of them, yet I still found myself enjoying every moment I spent at school. My teachers also seemed to be guite fond of me and my work ethic - I can't think of anything I did to make them dislike me, at least. In fact, I think they liked how much I loved learning and how excited I was to be there every day.

Overall, I had a hard time adapting to school. At first, I felt like an outsider but I made friends and started to see school as a place of growth and learning. I made solid friends, found my place with consistent studying and did well on exams. I got consistently high grades and became one of the most academically successful people in my year. After the holidays, exam time was back and I did well again. I loved sports day and made more friends. But by the end of the year, school was amazing, thanks to my teachers and friends.

MORE THAN JUST A BANK HOLIDAY!

A new bank holiday? An extra day off school? Brilliant! But why is St. Brigid's Day important, and why is it a new holiday for 2023?

In Irish Gaelic tradition, the calendar is split into 'Quarter Days', festivals marking the start of each season – summer was marked by Bealtaine, autumn by Lúnasa, winter by Samhain and spring was heralded by St Brigid's Day or Imbolc, falling on the 1st of February. The day is dedicated to St. Brigid, but prior to the Christianisation of Ireland, the festival of Imbolc was held on this day, celebrating birth, growth and renewal. Attached to this celebration was the goddess Brighid, patroness of poets, smith workers and livestock and goddess of healing. The festival then began to be associated with St. Brigid, who Christianised her tribe and founded Ireland's oldest monastery in Kildare. Crosses made with rushes were made on this day, and hung in houses, to gain the saint's blessing.

Brigid the saint and the goddess were both embodied through a real woman, and she is a role model for feminism. The whole world goes green for St. Patrick's Day, but it isn't until this year that we have a day for our matron saint. She founded a powerful and influential community in a hugely patriarchal world. She emanates the qualities we want to see in a new Ireland – protecting the environment, inclusivity, empowerment and determination.

St. Brigid's Day, although celebrated in Ireland, was never an official public holiday until now. Last year, a one-off public holiday was named on the 18th of March, to recognise and thank the workers who gave their all during the fight against COVID. The new permanent St. Brigid's Day holiday is the first public holiday to be named for a female saint. It marks the halfway point between winter solstice and the equinox, and is the beginning of spring. But the best thing about it... a day off school!




THE BARR BUAS







POST PRIMARY SCHOOLS SENIOR HURLING FINAL A HURLING TRADITION BORN IN ST.PETER'S

St. Peter's 1-19 Scoil Mhuire Kanturk 1-11

Kanturk may have been slight favourites heading into this Senior D final given the near home advantage they held at Banteer, and they lived up to that mantle in the opening exchanges, playing with aggression pace and no little skill to put St Peters under severe pressure.

Zac O' Brien hit St. Peters first point after a lovely run and strike from the wing to level it at a point a piece after 5 minutes however, by the time Sean Coughlan had pointed their second after 15 minutes Kanturk were in a 5-2 lead. Without the sterling work of Mark Lester at wing back, who was resolute in his work against the coming tide, that margin could have been much wider.

The issue at hand was clear to St Peters trainer Justin McCarthy – Kanturk's centre forward was roaming out the field as a third midfielder and hurling a lot of ball. McCarthy made the decision after twenty minutes to withdraw an inside forward, push centre back Dylan Barrett out as a third midfielder, and bring Darragh McCarthy into centre back, and it was not long before the move began to pay dividends.

Sean Coughlan, who had also been switched from corner to half forward; to get more involved, did just that when he conjured up a beautiful run and dummy before putting St.Peters within two. Then Dylan Barrett and Darragh McCarthy began to run the game around the centre of the field, which became the theme for the remainder of the proceedings. On 22 minutes Dylan produced a sensational block when a Kanturk score to stretch their lead looked certain and from the resulting play St.Peters were awarded a free which Darragh landed from all of 70 yards out, which was a moment in the game when instead of a possible 3 point deficit, Peters pulled it back to one, and suddenly the



town. Dylan followed this up 2 minutes later with another fine free from 65 yards to level it and 2 minutes after that, Darragh burst out from centre back and drove over a point from centre field that put Peters in front for the first time and the sixty-plus supporters who had made the trip went hoarse with delight.

Only a minute later captain James Desmond made a driving run that tore through the heart of the Kanturk defence, before being fouled 20 yards out. Liam Harrington stood over the free and smelled blood – instead of tapping it over the bar he buried it past the goalkeeper to put Peters firmly in the driving seat. Dylan added another before the break to make it 1-7 to 0-6 at half time.

Kanturk began the second half just as vigorously as the first. They pointed the first of the half to put only a goal between the sides and in that period the full back line of Conor









Hanlon, Andrew O'Mahony and Denis O' Brien stood up well to the pressure. Eoghan Farrell at centre field and Josh Horan at half back fought manfully to handle the onslaught and then came a period of exceptional hurling from Peters.

Sean Coughlan pointed two frees after wonderful sniping runs by Paul Canty left the Kanturk defenders with no option but to foul him. Then, either side of two more Sean Coughlan frees were three inspirational scores worthy of winning any game. The first was the point of the match. Dylan Barrett rose majestically to catch a puck out, found Sean Coughlan in midfield who played it to Darragh McCarthy who had thundered forward from centre back and his shot raised another white flag. The second was from James Desmond after wonderful tigerish half back play from Mark Lester to break up and attack, James picked up the loose ball at centre field and fired it over the bar from 65 yards out – every inch a captains point in what was every inch a captain's display. The last of the three was from Dylan, again from way out the field, he stylishly found his range and the roars from the stand could be heard all the way to Passage. All those scores had come without reply, and what had been a tightly fought contest was now looking almost like one way traffic however, with 5 minutes to go Kanturk fought back and scored 1-1 to put them within 6 points, and suddenly the fight back was on.

However, Sean Coughlan; calmness personified, found his range with two more lovely frees after good work by Liam Harrington and substitute Noah O' Sullivan, before he added a third from play to stretch the lead to 8 and put Peters out of sight.

Justin McCarthy presented the trophy to captain James Desmond after the match and amongst his wise words said, "there might not be a great hurling tradition in St.Peters, but a tradition was born today." If that indeed does prove to be the case, then these players, this team and this performance will live long in the memory.
